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Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy	All eligible employers who saw a 15% drop in revenue in March and a 30% drop in revenue in April and May. Eligible employers include charities, nonprofits, social enterprises, RCAAs, and non-public colleges and schools. (Publicly-funded hospitals, universities, colleges, and school boards are not eligible.) The CEWS has been extended for a further 12 weeks and will now cover periods up to and including August 29, 2020. The revenue loss requirement may be revisited for the June, July, and August periods.	Government will subsidize 75% of employee wages to a maximum of \$847 per week per employee. No cap on how much an employer can receive. Employers are expected to make their best effort to top-up employees' salaries to bring them to pre-crisis levels. The top-up is not mandatory, though. Applies to active employees and well as those who have been furloughed because of a lack of work. To measure their revenue loss, it is proposed that all employers have the flexibility to compare their revenue of March, April and May 2020 to that of the same month of 2019, or to an average of their revenue earned in January and February 2020 -- whichever is more advantageous. Charities and non-profit organizations can choose to either include or exclude revenue from government when calculating their revenues -- whichever is more advantageous. Organizations that qualify for the wage subsidy will be able to furlough staff to keep them on payroll, if there is a lack of work for them to do, and receive a full refund of employer contributions towards CPP, EI, QPP and other such programs. Wage subsidies will be retroactive to March 15. Interest-free loans of up to \$40,000. 25% of the loan will be forgiven if the loan is repaid by December 31, 2022. Loans are arranged through organizations' regular financial institutions. 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Emergency Community Support Fund	Charities and nonprofits that deliver essential services to those in need	The federal government announced an investment of \$350 million to support vulnerable Canadians through charities and non-profit organizations that deliver essential services to vulnerable populations. It will support a variety of activities, such as: increasing volunteer-based home deliveries of groceries & medications; providing transportation services, like accompanying or driving seniors or persons with disabilities to appointments; scaling up help lines that provide information and support; helping vulnerable Canadians access government benefits; providing training, supplies, and other required supports to volunteers; replacing in-person, one-on-one contact and social gatherings with virtual contact through phone calls, texts, teleconferences, or the Internet. 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Canada Emergency Commercial Rent Assistance	Small businesses, including nonprofits and charities. Organizations that own properties are landlords themselves and would like to provide rent reductions	This program will lower rent by 75% for small businesses that have been affected by COVID-19. The program will provide forgivable loans to qualifying commercial property owners to cover 50% of three monthly rent payments that are payable by eligible small business tenants who are experiencing financial hardship during April, May, and June. The loans will be forgiven if the mortgaged property owner agrees to reduce the eligible tenants' rent by at least 75% for the three corresponding months under a rent forgiveness agreement, which will include a term not to evict the tenant while the agreement is in place. The small business tenant would cover the remainder, up to 25% of the rent. Impacted tenants are organizations paying less than \$50,000 per month in rent (per location) and who have temporarily ceased operations or have experienced at least a 70% drop in pre-COVID-19 revenues. Charities and nonprofits can choose whether to include or exclude revenues from governments when calculating their revenue drop. Tenants' consolidated financial statements (in the case of multiple locations) must show annual revenues less than \$20 million. Canada Emergency Response Benefit	Workers who: Residing in Canada, who are at least 15 years old; Who have stopped working because of COVID-19 and have not voluntarily quit their job or are eligible for EI regular or sickness benefits; Who had income of at least \$5,000 in 2019 or in the 12 months prior to the date of their application; and Who are or expect to be without employment or self-employment income for at least 14 consecutive days in the initial four-week period; For subsequent benefit periods, they expect to have no employment or self-employment income.	If you have stopped working because of COVID-19, the Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB) may provide you with temporary income support. The CERB provides \$500 a week for up to 16 weeks. To begin the application process, you'll need to answer a few simple questions.
